**Part III, Statement of Program Service Accomplishments: Line 4a, Line 4b****Line 4a: Global Peace Initiatives** Expenses \$770,490

The Prem Rawat Foundation's Global Peace Initiative sponsored seven events from Moscow to New Zealand. Audiences of professors, senators, community leaders, nobility, and prisoners responded with equal enthusiasm to Prem Rawat's message of peace. Grants of over \$282,000 were made to the Words of Peace Global Foundation to support the media production and distribution of Prem Rawat's message worldwide.

In 2012 The Prem Rawat Foundation (TPRF) developed a formal curriculum for its *Peace Education Program* (PEP) and began translating it to other languages. This program had been offered in prisons for five years and has now expanded to a wide variety of settings including adult education, colleges and universities, community-based organizations, civic organizations, hospital and hospice staff, veterans groups, retirement communities, and wellness centers. The new Peace Education Program curriculum is a 10-week multimedia course based on themes from Prem Rawat's international addresses. Its purpose is to help people discover their own inner resources, such as strength, choice, and hope – and the possibility of personal peace.

**Line 4b: Humanitarian Initiatives** Expenses \$501,496

In 2012 TPRF made 12 grants to help provide food, water, disaster aid, and eye care for people in need, in addition to funding its own *Food for People* (FFP) programs. Fresh water was made available to children, farmers, and villagers from Cambodia, to Ecuador, to South Sudan. Disaster relief was provided to earthquake and tsunami survivors in Japan and flood victims in Fiji. TPRF contributors raised funds to provide aid for people displaced by Hurricane Sandy on the East Coast of the US. Additionally, TPRF donations supplied food which helped bring better health to malnourished children in Haiti and Mexico. Essential eye care benefited people unable to afford it in India and the Palestinian Territory.

The Food for People program supported three facilities in 2012: 1) Ontinibi, Ghana 2) Bantoli, India and 3) Tasarpu, Nepal. The **Otinibi, Ghana, FFP** facility opened in May 2012, and immediately began serving over 400 children each school day. Attendance at school rose from 160 to 400 in the first 6 months. With increased energy, the children are able to stay focused in school. The **Bantoli, India, FFP** facility has become the hub of the community after seven years of operation. Children and elderly come daily to eat and learn about the importance of hygiene. Local crops are yielding more and better-quality food, as residents learn about efficient farming methods. The **Tasarpu, Nepal, FFP** facility, in the mountains above Kathmandu, serves over 700 children and ailing adults daily, and local people working in the FFP gardens learn about organic gardening. The program in Nepal was recognized by a Nepal government body regulating nonprofit organizations as an "innovative intervention" in literacy programs. One grade has been added each year to the local school to accommodate increasing demand for higher learning, a fact attributed entirely to the FFP program.
